

2026 VASCULAR ANNUAL MEETING CALL FOR HOT TOPIC PROPOSALS

The Society for Vascular Surgery (SVS) is seeking proposals for **Hot Topics** in consideration of the Vascular Annual Meeting (VAM), June 10-13, 2026, at the Hynes Convention Center, Boston, MA.

Description of Hot Topics:

Hot Topics in vascular surgery is an educational session designed to highlight the most current, practice-changing developments in the field. The talks in this session should focus on rapidly evolving areas of patient care, technology, and/or research, giving vascular surgeons timely updates they can apply directly in clinical practice. The submissions are meant to be fast paced, no more than 15 minutes each, highly focused, and clinically relevant, ensuring participants walk away with practical knowledge and a clear sense of the latest trends shaping vascular surgery.

Submit a single lecture idea on a timely issue; SVS will group selected lectures into one session.

Review & Selection Processes

After online submission, <u>proposals are judged blindly</u> through an online platform by the Postgraduate Education Committee (PGEC). Proposals scoring above a certain threshold are typically considered for the VAM program, sometimes with suggestions for further development, based on the overall content needs and related requirements.

Post-Selection

If a proposal is chosen for inclusion in the VAM program, submitters are required to:

 Collaborate with the PGEC on the development and delivery of the proposed topics and adherence to all meeting requirements.

About the Call

- Proposals submitted outside the online process will not be considered or reviewed.
- Submission does not guarantee acceptance.
- The email provided in the submission will be notified by the end of October if their proposal has been selected.
- The deadline for submission is 3pm CT, Wednesday, October 15.

Components Required for Submission (all proposals must be submitted through the <u>submission site</u>, however please use the list below to work on your proposal prior to submitting)

- Session Title
- Topic Classification select an overarching subject area from a drop-down menu
- Purpose/Justification what is the educational need you are trying to address?
- Topic Summary description of the topic that will be presented.

ACCME Standards

The Education Council and Committees oversee the development and implementation of CME activities and as such volunteers must adhere to The Standards for Integrity and Independence in Accredited Continuing

AI Policy

Where authors use generative artificial intelligence (AI) and AI-assisted technologies in the writing process, authors should only use these technologies to improve readability and language. Applying the technology should be done with human oversight and control, and authors should carefully review and edit the result, as AI can generate authoritative-sounding output that can be incorrect, incomplete or biased. AI and AI-assisted technologies should not be listed as an author or co-author or be cited as an author. Authorship implies responsibilities and tasks that can only be attributed to and performed by humans, as outlined in Elsevier's AI policy for authors.

Disclosure instructions

Authors must disclose the use of generative AI and AI-assisted technologies in the writing process by adding a statement at the end of their "summary" task. The statement should be entitled 'Declaration of Generative AI and AI-assisted technologies in the writing process'.

Statement: During the preparation of this work the author(s) used [NAME TOOL / SERVICE] in order to [REASON].

After using this tool/service, the author(s) reviewed and edited the content as needed and take(s) full responsibility for the content of the publication.

This declaration does not apply to the use of basic tools for checking grammar, spelling, references, etc. If there is nothing to disclose, there is no need to add a statement.
